

Eastport resident Tova Keblish opens a Center Moriches boutique with unique gifts

Eastport resident Tova Keblish lost her son, Gavin, at the young age of 23, unexpectedly, about three years ago. After a long career in corporate procurement, she never dreamed of opening up her own shop, until now.

Gavin's Treasures is what she is calling a "unique boutique." After losing her job back in October, she decided it was time to do something new and in the name of her son.

Every day, she looked at a glass mosaic made from her son's trophies featuring red, green and blue. It made her happy, and that's when she got the idea to try to do the same for others.

"I look at it every day and decided to do something to help people as part of the grieving process," she said of the shop that features inspirational, spiritual and memorial gifts with a little fun and beauty. "Everything I have is different and unusual. I hope people will pick something up for others to make them happy."

She also hopes opening the shop will help her in her grieving process as well.

She rented the space, located on Main Street in Center Moriches, and the doors officially opened last month, with a ribbon cutting mid-May. Earlier in the month, Keblish called for artists to help curate the items for sale.


Pieces include cards as low as \$2.95 to larger display pieces for about \$295, with everything else in between. Most items were purchased from vendors at gift shows, including trunks and trinkets.

"There's a little bit of everything for everyone," she promised.

Her son, Gavin, whom the store was named for, graduated from Eastport-South Manor High School and attended SUNY Albany. Every month, raffles will also be done through the shop for the ultimate goal of creating a "Gavin's Understanding" scholarship fund in his name.



Winning makes them happy

Helping Makes U Happy wins two Imagine Awards, each with a \$5,000 grant

The founders of Helping Makes U Happy, Keith and Cassy Caputo, are constantly spending their days giving to others and helping the community. But in a rare occurrence, it was they who received a pretty sweet gift.

Helping Makes U Happy was the recipient of two awards at the Long Island Imagine Awards, hosted by Cerini & Associates, LLP. In its seventh year, it is one of the top award programs for nonprofits on Long Island. Helping Makes U Happy earned two awards: The Vanguard insurance Agency Rising Star Award and the Nerds that Care Fan Favorite Award. The fan favorite was a public poll that allowed people to vote for their favorite nonprofit, from which Helping Makes U Happy received the most, with over 5,000 at the last count. Each award comes with a \$5,000 grant.

"It was amazing," Keith Caputo said of his experience winning the awards and attending

the ceremony.

Keith and his mom started the nonprofit out of their home in 2015, neither of whom had run a nonprofit before, but simply guided by their mission of trying to help others. Since then, they've grown to be one of the staples of the Center Moriches and greater Moriches community and have now officially been noticed as a leader on the island.

"To be recognized as one of the top nonprofits across Long Island is just mind-boggling," Cassy Caputo said.

Over 170 nonprofit applications were submitted to win a grant in each of five categories: Innovation, Leadership Excellence, Rising Star, Social Impact and Arts and Culture. Of this pool, 20 were selected as finalists and one in each category, as well as a fan favorite was awarded the grant live at a ceremony on April 30. Keith Caputo was also proud of the trophy he got for each award. The Helping Makes U Happy team also had a chance to network and meet people from all over the island with whom they shared their mission, and Cassy Caputo said this was as valuable as the grant money and award.

Now, Helping Makes U Happy is looking to expand some more of their programs to

reach more people, especially with veterans. The nonprofit has programs that occur every year and also does new service projects when needed. They are currently preparing to hand over five scholarships to local students. They have also been conducting fundraisers for veterans and collected food and clothing for out-of-work government employees during the shutdown earlier this year.

Their next venture: Hollywood. Keith and Cassy are trying to get on the Ellen DeGeneres show to help spread the message of Helping Makes U Happy. They believe the show is a perfect fit for Keith to spread the nonprofit's message.

Honoring our fallen soldier

A tree is planted in Kalers Pond Park to commemorate Andy O'Keeffe, who died fighting in Iraq last year

Kalers Pond Park is now home to the memory of a Center Moriches soldier who was killed serving the country he loved. Andreas "Andy" O'Keeffe was flying with the New York Air National Guard's 106th Rescue Wing when he was killed in Iraq in early 2018.

Organized by the Moriches Chamber of Commerce, the ceremony brought out residents, veterans organizations, police, and O'Keeffe's family: his mother Mary Ann, brother Shán, and girlfriend Allison Denniston. O'Keeffe earned a bachelor's degree at the University of South Florida and a law degree from Georgetown University. He joined the 106th in 2013 and was one of seven airmen, along with two other Long Islanders—Master Sgt. Chris Raguso, 39, of Commack, and Staff Sgt. Dashan J. Briggs, 30, of Port Jefferson Station—who were killed when a HH-60G Pave Hawk rescue

helicopter crashed on March 15, 2018.

O'Keeffe was remembered by colleagues, family, and friends as a person who always wanted the best out of others, and was able to inspire them. He emphasized teamwork and was able to make a team better just through his presence. The other names of the men killed alongside O'Keeffe were read at his dedication ceremony, because he would have wanted it.

"He gave his life, and we thank him for that," said Miriam Gillies, a director on the chamber and the organizer of the event.

A magnolia tree was planted to honor O'Keeffe, and the Town of Brookhaven will be

placing a plaque at its base with an inscription for him. The magnolia tree is seen as a symbol of dignity and nobility.

"This tree will one day provide shelter from the storm, be it teeming rain or blazing sun, much like Andy did during his time here serving with us," said Col. Michael Bank of the 106th at the ceremony.

O'Keeffe also served during Hurricane Harvey recovery, did missions on the Horn of Africa and was deployed to Afghanistan twice. When he died, his father remembered him as someone who always felt like he had to do more for his country.



On Saturday, June 15, the Moriches Community Center will host the annual Anthony Parlato Memorial 5K Run/Walk and Half-Mile Fun Run for elementary students. This is the 18th year of the race and the sixth year since the race was renamed to honor former co-director, Anthony Parlato, who passed away unexpectedly in 2014.


"The loss of this vibrant man was devastating to our community, and especially to our youth with whom Anthony worked directly, always encouraging them to make more positive behavior choices and to contribute time to improving our communities," said Kathleen Johnson, executive director of the Moriches Community Center. "His favorite saying, 'help someone today,' continues to inspire young and old alike today."

Parlato and Johnson founded the community center in 2000 to address growing crime for youth in the area, and wanted to provide a place where students could find alternative ways to spend their time. Now, the community center is in a permanent location at the new Moriches Bay Recreation Center, owned by the Town of Brookhaven.

This year's race features a new route which can be viewed at MCC's website: www.morichescommunitycenter.org/ events/5k-run-walk, along with links to race registration and sponsorship opportunities. The route starts and ends at Neville Park between Canal Street and Union Avenue in Center Moriches.

CHECK-IN

Check-in for the 5K will be from 7:15 - 8:30 a.m. at Neville Park, and the 5K goes off promptly at 9 a.m. The kids' Fun Run will start at 8:15 a.m. Entry fees are \$20 for runners preregistered, \$25 for runners day of the race, \$15 for walkers, and \$10 for Fun Runners.



New superintendent to focus on 'whole-child' education

Ron Masera will become the new superintendent of Center Moriches schools in July

The Center Moriches School District has hired Ronald Masera as its new superintendent. Masera comes from the top post at the 140-student Remsenburg-Speonk School District to replace retiring superintendent Russell Stewart.

"The entire school community will benefit from his knowledge and wealth of experience in education," Stewart told the Tide recently. "I think Dr. Masera will continue the progressive vision of the district and lead Center Moriches to many new achievements."

Masera hails from Eastport, where he's lived for 20 years with his family. He has led the Remsenburg-Speonk district for eight years, after being principal of Westhampton Beach Elementary School for five years. He is also the vice president of Suffolk County School Superintendents Association. Masera also previously lived in the Moriches area before moving to Eastport, and said he's excited to come back to the community for the job.

"I feel connected to the community in a pretty special way," Masera said.

This is Masera's first time leading a K-12 district, upgrading from his 140-student school to the 1,500-plus in Center Moriches. He was attracted to the role by the strong sense of community and the direction that the district has been going in the past few years. He also admires the implementation of International Baccalaureate programming, which will start in the middle school this year and then begin at the high school. He was also

happy to see efforts to educate students on a social-emotional level, one of the philosophies he's been passionate about.

Masera said it concerns him how levels of mental illnesses like anxiety and depression are rising in young people, and how schools can always do better to help students understand that part of their being. He said it takes a close-knit level of really knowing kids and understanding their needs, intervening early when red flags are noticed, and teaching kids how to understand self-care techniques for themselves to adequately educate them.

"I think Center Moriches is doing a lot of things well," Masera said.

The incoming superintendent said he wouldn't be rushing to make changes, as he plans to spend time getting to know his colleagues, parents, and students. A big change, he said, will be the requirement to delegate high-level responsibilities of the district. In Remsenburg-Speonk, he was the superintendent, handled business matters and the budget, curriculum, and was the principal of the elementary school. But now, he has fellow administrators who deal with those areas.

"The Center Moriches Board of Education was extremely pleased to choose Dr. Ron Masera to lead our district," said Joshua Foster, president of the Center Moriches Board of Education. "Our decision was based upon his vast experience as a teacher, principal and superintendent, as well as his track record for success. We believe that he will instill professionalism, build morale, and support the board and community's vision for growth of our academic and athletic offerings, while ensuring that we continue to meet the divergent needs of all children in our district."

Masera will assume his role in July. ■

EM, CM, ESM budgets pass

East Moriches

East Moriches voters have approved the 2019-'20 budget, which allocates \$28,585,605 for school services, up almost \$857,000 from 2018-'19. Voters also approved designating three high schools as receiving schools for students for another five years. This includes a 3.3 percent tax levy increase. The board of education race was won by Lori Pagano (291) and Jennifer Burke (289), who will fill the two open seats and defeated Gene Kleine (224).

Voters approved the \$44,101,280 budget for district services, an increase of just over \$1 million from last year. It will maintain all current programming and incorporate the debt from recent capital projects. Due to additional state aid, the board was able to decrease the levy from a previously proposed 3.3 percent to 2.9

percent. Two board of education seats were filled by unopposed candidates Thomas Kelly (533) and Marcus Babzien (508).

Eastport-South Manor

Voters in the Eastport-South Manor district shot down a proposition to add armed security guards to each of its schools, but did pass the \$96,354,523 budget, a \$2.8 million increase from last year. The tax levy increase would have been 3.69 percent for both propositions, above the allowable cap. The budget

alone is a 2.75 percent levy, below the tax cap. Three board of education seats were granted to Donald Fox (987), Francesco Ferraro (913), and Michael Byrnes (790).

Community comes together for Kim

A mourning group of teachers, students, and parents pack the lawn of Clayton Huey Elementary in the rain to pay tribute

Though she was not a resident of Center Moriches, Kim Hardwick was as much a member of the Center Moriches family as could be. In fact, oftentimes, she was its leader.

A mourning community of parents, students, and teachers gathered on the lawn of Hardwick's second home, Clayton Huey Elementary, on May 14 to pay homage to the leader, mother, and friend, who died suddenly in April at age 50 due to complications from surgery.

"She was a passionate, caring leader, whose impact can still be felt throughout the halls of Clayton Huey," said Dennis Licci, acting principal of Clayton Huey Elementary.

There were dozens of emotional young students in the crowd during the memorial, suddenly, probably not for the first time, realizing the hole that Hardwick has left in the community. Often, when students are known by the principal, it's either for great or bad reasons, more often the latter. But Hardwick, students

and teachers said, took the time to get to know the people around her and showed compassion and a drive to help them realize their best selves. Hardwick was seen as an inspiring figure even

to 10-year-olds, who appreciated her positive posted messages, like "help someone, even when they can't help you back." That statement and those gestures were the embodiment of Hardwick's presence. She called students "rock stars" and offered high-fives and hugs in the hallways, as if pepping up her team to take on the day.

"Mrs. Hardwick taught us to believe in ourselves and to have self-love, and we will remember her and that for the rest of our lives," said Madison Bennett, a fifth-grade student who had a special relationship with Hardwick.

It wasn't just the boss that Kim Hardwick was—though teachers agreed she hated that word—but the friend that was there for everyone. Hardwick told her staff to "live it," choose courage over comfort, and sometimes more bluntly, "Put on your big-girl pants." Whichever phrase she chose to use, those on the receiving end tended to listen.

"Everyone deserves a friend like Kim," said Danielle Sirico, a kindergarten teacher at Clayton Huey.

Óne day, Sirico called in sick to take care of her son, also at a time when life was just a bit too

much—but then Hardwick called. She asked to drop by Sirico's house for a quick brainstorm about a beautification project. Reluctantly, Sirico agreed, unknowing that when she opened the door, her principal would be joined by the superintendent and a bouquet of flowers, beaming to tell her that she was the winner of the SCOPE Award. Sirico said Hardwick often saw things in her that she didn't see herself.

Hardwick's family also joined in the ceremony, giving a deeper look into how Hardwick wasn't just an exceptional school leader, but a family-lover who somehow found new hours in the day to host gatherings, spend time with her husband and kids, and volunteer to help others.

"I know Kim lived a life that made her happy," said Donna Mandella, Hardwick's older sister. "And for that, I am grateful."

Hardwick married Christopher Honor in 2002, and had four children, Emma, Hannah, Korrey and Jourdan.

"She always wanted to make sure that your kids were kind and passionate individuals," Honor said of Hardwick's passion for the Clayton Huey community. ■


