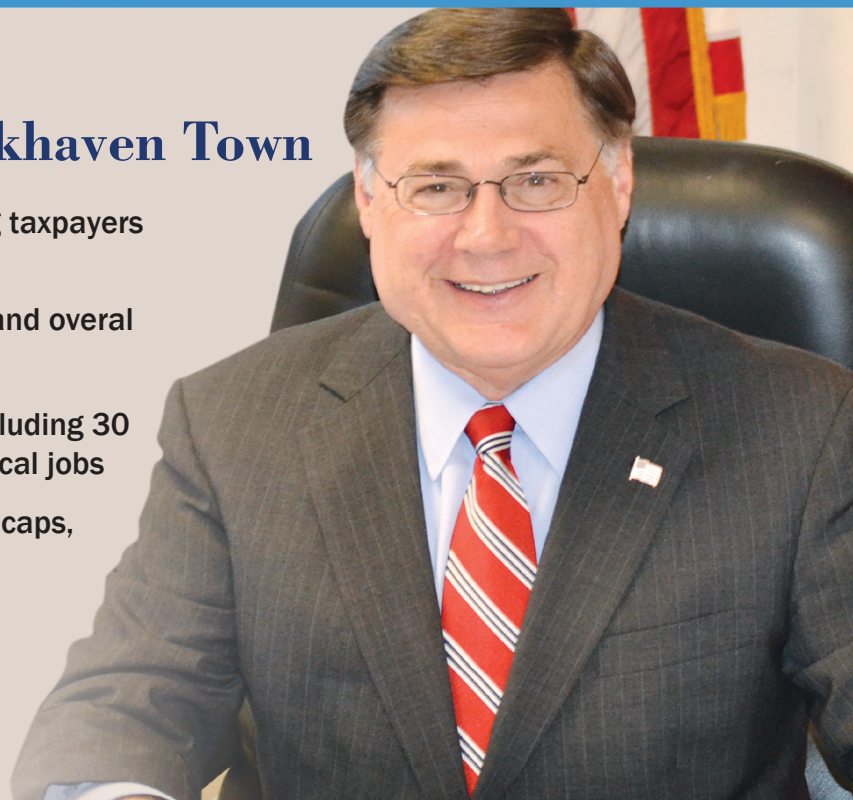

Max's last haunted house

Popular charity initiative from Center Moriches teen will be last, but biggest

For years, Max Mastropierro, a sophomore at Center Moriches High School, has collected, maintained, and designed props and costumes for his annual haunted house. His loving and supportive parents have let him use the house to bring people along on a spooky ride through whatever theme his mind creates.

But this year will be the last instance of Max's haunted house, as his family will be moving out of the Center Moriches district. They will be splitting their time between a home in Florida and a condo in Manorville. While in Center Moriches, their basement and garage have become storage spaces for Max's props and equipment, but he will sell some of that to another haunted house host, while keeping some of the more rare and collectible items.

Max has been planning this year's event

for a few months, and has had the idea since Halloween last year. It will be a little different this year, as Max will bring visitors through the house and out back into the woods for the first time. Max will act as a tour guide, taking you through the roughly five-minute journey (of which the contents are top-secret).

"It's exciting and a little bit stressful, but in the end we all have a good time," Max said.

The annual event is a fundraiser for Spirit of Children, the nonprofit wing of Spirit of Halloween. Max has developed relationships with the executives there, and hopes to work there when he is old enough. He earned \$2,000 for the charity last year, and hopes to break that record this year. Spirit of Children works with hospitals and children's care centers to improve life for children who are terminally ill or are forced to stay in the hospital. This year, Max is connecting Spirit of Children with Stony Brook's Children's Hospital. Max and his family recently returned from a trip to Spirit headquarters, where they brought back some costumes to donate to Helping Makes U Happy.

To attend the haunted walk, the Mastropierros are asking for a donation to

their cause. Volunteers from Center Moriches High School will contribute to the event by dressing in costume or with help organizing. The themes are circus, farm and swamp, each in different sections throughout the space.

Library publicist was well known in her 50-year career

Maurine Donnelly was a columnist and publicist for the Center Moriches Library

Maurine Donnelly, a former publicist for the Center Moriches Library, as well as an artist, poet, and community volunteer, died in June at age 87.

Donnelly was recently honored for 50 years of service to the library in 2014 by then-director Nan Peel. According to the library, her work began in 1964 when the building was across the street from King Kullen, which is now the school administration building. She wrote numerous publications referring to the library collection. She used the old-fashioned tools of a typewriter and mimeograph, and it was also the time of card catalogues, which Donnelly updated regularly through her research.

Donnelly earned her B.A. in English at Carthage College in 1956. She left the Midwest to study library science at Rutgers University in New Jersey. Donnelly completed master's level library science courses while also married and raising children. In addition

to her employment at the Center Moriches library, she was a founding member of the Friends of the Library, and authored several publications on local themes, including "Hurricane of 1938." She was also a poet, and developed the monthly Poetry Roundtable at the Library, which continues today. Her late husband, C. Gerard Donnelly, was the first full-time director of Center Moriches Library (1964-1990).

"The library board and the staff of the library wish to celebrate her years of service, and to offer their condolences to her devoted readership, family, and friends," the library wrote in a Facebook post.

Donnelly was also active in local civic groups and was a frequent volunteer in the community. She is survived by daughter, Patrice Donnelly and husband Paul Boben of Columbia, Md.; son, Eric Donnelly, of Center Moriches; stepson, Robert Donnelly and wife, Wendy, of Montclair, N.J.; step-granddaughter, Kathryn Tague (née Donnelly) and husband, Hugh Tague Jr.; two sons, Jeremy Easton and Ian Carroll; and adoptive grandchildren, Yana and Michael. She was preceded in death by her son Stephen, brother Oliver Clifford Anderson Jr., and husband Carroll Gerard. Donnelly is laid to rest at Long Island National Cemetery. ■

Town to redesign, build boat ramp

New features will minimize the amount of runoff that enters Moriches Bay

The Town of Brookhaven will resurface and redesign the boat ramp at the end of Maple Avenue in East Moriches.

“We are about to undertake a project at the end of Maple Avenue to mitigate point source inputs from the boat ramp thus minimizing the amount of polluted runoff that enters Moriches Bay,” said Councilman Dan Panico

The road end at the boat ramp will be redesigned to direct stormwater into a

vegetated swale adjacent to the ramp and into a retention area on the south side, while modifying the pitch of the ramp to minimize impacts from storm surges. The asphalt will be raised 14 inches at its highest point to keep the bay at bay. The marina parking lot will also be resurfaced and pitched to direct stormwater into the newly designed swale.

According to the Water Environment Research Foundation, vegetated swales are broad, shallow channels designed to convey and infiltrate stormwater runoff. The swales are vegetated along the bottom and sides of the channel, with side vegetation at a height greater than the maximum design stormwater volume. WERF said the design helps to improve water quality. ■

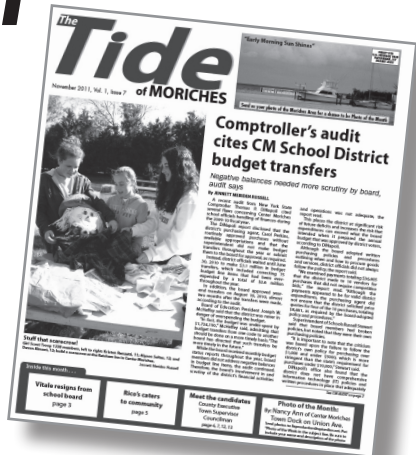

Massage with a focus on self-care

New shop in East Moriches gives personal experience to healing

Oksana Rahbari is not a typical massage therapist. Her goal in opening Therapeutic Touch was not just to give excellent massages for people looking to heal, but to have them understand how they can experience new, necessary forms of personal wellness.

"I want to expose people, to teach people to take care of themselves," Rahbari said.

Rahbari, of East Moriches, has been doing massage therapy for two years at a local gym, when she decided to open her own space this summer. She held the grand opening for her studio at 493 Montauk Highway in East Moriches on Sept. 22. Before that, she was a stay-at-home mother for nine years. Rahbari is a licensed massage therapist, and is licensed in massage cupping (a long-used service recently made popular by Michael Phelps), and manual lymphatic drainage.

When she was young, Rahbari had a bad experience going to get a

massage. Her goal in her work is to not let that happen for others. She turns her service into a personal experience, listening to the client and steering them toward whichever type of method would bring them the healing they are looking for.

She has seen the positive results of massage, and attributes her own health and well-being to the fact that she has learned how the practice can be helpful. She wants people to be aware of how taking care of yourself is just as important as it is for non-living things like our houses, cars, etc.

"You have to take care of yourself now, before things start breaking down," she said.

Rahbari plans to expand her practice to include collaborations on other wellness services. She wants to bring in someone who can do acupuncture, someone who can teach yoga techniques and more. She'd also like to establish personal wellness workshops to give people the tools they need to practice self-care.

Man killed in Manorville crash

Suffolk County Police Seventh Squad detectives are investigating a single-vehicle crash that killed a man in Manorville on Sept. 15.
A 1977 Datsun, driven by a 28-year-old man, was traveling westbound on Mill Road when the driver lost control of the vehicle and struck a tree, near Halsey Manor Road, at approximately 1 p.m.
The man, who was alone in the vehicle, was pronounced dead at the scene. The victim's identification is being withheld pending notification of kin.

Housing, the essential ingredient for economic renaissance

There is no question that Patchogue Village has reinvented itself and become a top Long Island destination both for living and working, as it has benefitted from new economic development and job creation in the last 15 years.
A model for downtown revitalization, Patchogue has been widely recognized as one of the most transformative villages on Long Island, earning accolades from the Long Island Index, the Long Island Housing Partnership, the Regional Planning Association and Vision Long Island.
As various housing developments have sprung up, so have many new businesses and recreational activities, and there are more feet on the street to patronize local merchants, giving new vibrancy to Patchogue's downtown.

New Village, Copper Beach, Artspace, River Walk, River View and Seacrest have a combined total of 663 housing units, all within walking distance of Patchogue's downtown commercial district and its Long Island Rail Road station.
The Long Island Housing Partnership has participated in the development of affordable housing and has provided valuable technical assistance to multifamily housing developers in the Patchogue community. The public/private partnership between developers and nonprofits has helped turned a once downtrodden village into one of Long Island's gems.
The village's revitalization has been contagious, leading to upgrades and improvements at existing entertainment venues like the Patchogue Theatre for the Performing Arts and expansion of the village's cultural scene, with Artspace, Gather Art Studio and clubs and

restaurants featuring live music.
And unlike most places on Long Island, Patchogue is getting younger. The average age of a Patchogue resident is 35, seven years younger than the Suffolk County average age of 42.
The prosperity sowed in the village's business district has also spread to its residential community, boosting property values. The median home sales price in July 2019 was \$340,000, more than 26 percent higher than the \$268,384 median from just two years ago.
A study by the Long Island Regional Planning Council touted Patchogue's revitalization and found it accounted for \$693.3 million in economic growth from 2000 to 2017. And according to the report, Patchogue's rebound is likely to continue, with an estimated \$239 million in economic growth and more than 2,500 new jobs expected through 2029 as a result of more development projects in the pipeline. There's a lot more to come.
And though it's getting younger, Patchogue is a community for all ages.
Despite claims of NIMBY's, the Patchogue-Medford School District has reaped financial benefits.

The estimated costs are based upon the 40 enrolled students living in the 663 housing units as of December 14, 2018. This surplus revenue will increase substantially as the Industrial Development Agency (IDA) tax abatement given to New Village	

decreases.
A new 128-unit assisted living development called Village Walk Senior Living will allow residents who are no longer able to live at home to stay in the community and take advantage of the thriving downtown. The complex has a movie theatre, a wellness center, activity room and a wine room for happy hour. It has a bistro and dining area where residents can have three meals a day. It also includes housekeeping services, laundry and a free car service for short trips.
An upgrade to five existing Patchogue parks is also underway, thanks to a private \$5 million donation. With the support of an additional NYS Grant of \$2.5 million, Shorefront Park, in particular, is being redesigned with a "living shoreline" and a pedestrian boardwalk that will go from

the Mascot Dock to the softball field. The boardwalk will be ADA compliant and will have lighting, plantings, and benches.
Meanwhile, the myriad new housing opportunities serving various income levels, and transformative thinking by local officials and business and civic leaders, have proven to be the main catalyst for the village's ongoing revival.
Patchogue understands that it needs to provide housing for all - despite age, race, national origin, color, religion, sex, disability, income level, familial status, marital status, sexual orientation, military status, creed - and it has made decisions that have yielded success and prosperity.
And now, Patchogue continues to enjoy a true renaissance.

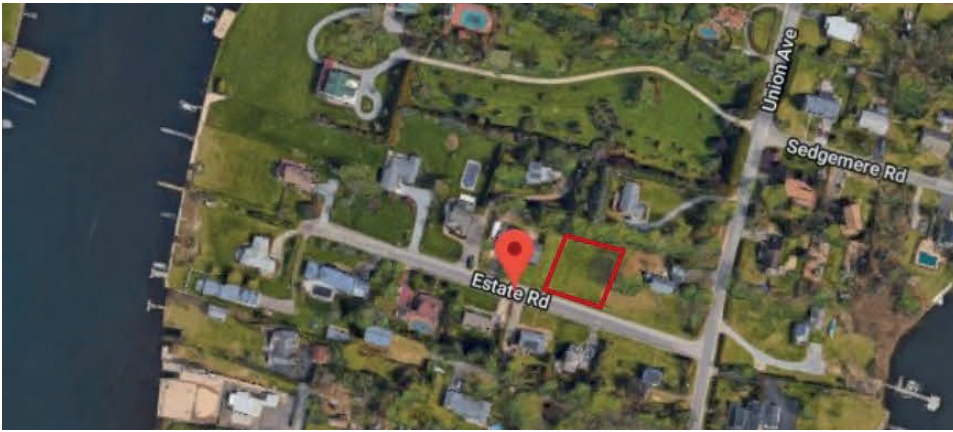
