Center Moriches Library goes mobile

Book Bike is on the move from Main Street and beyond

The Center Moriches Free Public Library has taken the show on the road, and library patrons may have seen a shiny, green bicycle filled with library books and material at local beaches, along Main Street, or other outdoor locations, thanks to a generous donation made by the Center Moriches Friends of the Library.

The Center Moriches Book Bike took its maiden voyage from library headquarters on Main Street, to the chamber of commerce's annual Spring Fair, held on Saturday, June 12, on the grounds of Our Lady Queen of Apostles in Center Moriches. Margie DeCaro, head of Children's Services, operated the bike, and said that the reception at the fair was overwhelmingly positive.

"People were intrigued," said DeCaro. "They had a lot of questions."

The evolution of the Book Bike started with a Facebook post, DeCaro explained. An avid cyclist, DeCaro said she ran across a post about "librarian bikers," and thought that it was about librarians who, like her, enjoyed cycling. After further investigation, DeCaro found that the post was actually about libraries using Book Bikes in their respective communities to help promote library services and programs. DeCaro approached library director Marcie Litjens with the idea, who then discussed it with the Friends of the Library, and the rest is history.

"The library is always looking for innovative ways to reach out to the com-

munity," she said. "A Book Bike is fun and inviting, and an easy way to begin a conversation about how our library offers a variety of services."

The Book Bike is manufactured by Icicle Tricycles, a company based in Portland, Ore. While every Book Bike has the same frame, different accessories are available, such as a cooler. The library staff chose the book basket with the chalkboard finish and the darkgreen color for the bike itself. The books, which will be selected based on the audience and location that the Book Bike is visiting, are also donated by the Friends of the Library.

The Book Bike will be on the move this summer, with planned appearances at Kaler's Pond, Webby's Beach and at chamber-sponsored events, just in time for National Book Bike Week, being observed Aug. 2-6, said Litjens. The bike will be operated by DeCaro and other librarians. Litjens hopes to have a go at the wheel as well.

"I may have to convince Margie to let me have a turn," she quipped. ■

WHO ARE THE FRIENDS OF THE CENTER MORICHES LIBRARY?

Friends of the Center Moriches Library is a non-for-profit, charitable group of civil-minded neighbors formed to support the Center Moriches Library, explained Friends of the Library president Nadine Livoti. Oktoberfest to delight again

13th annual Oktoberfest slated for September and will benefit Camp Pa-Qua-Tuck

Grab your beer steins and lederhosen, Moriches Rotary Club's 13th annual Oktoberfest festival is coming back to town after a year hiatus due to COVID-19—and they expect this year to be their biggest celebration ever, according to Peter Traina, vice president of Moriches Rotary and chairperson of the Oktoberfest event.

"We've all been cooped up for basically the past year and a half, so we think it will be a good year. We are in hopes that this will be our best year to date," said Traina.

Oktoberfest will take place at Camp Pa-Qua-Tuck in Center Moriches on Sept. 24 from 6 until 11 p.m.; Sept. 25 from noon until 11 p.m.; and Sept. 26 from 2 until 6 p.m. The family-friendly event costs \$15 per person over the age of 21 and includes a free beer, wine or soft drink. Anyone under 21 is free; and children are encouraged to attend.

According to Traina, the event will



feature local vendors, carnival rides and games, as well as a biergarten featuring German beers, German dancers and German bands.

Moriches Rotary's Oktoberfest is modeled off of the original Oktoberfest in Germany, which started in 1810 in celebration of the marriage of the Prince of Bavaria, according to "Encyclopedia Britannica." Traditionally, the mayor of Munich taps the first keg, prompting two weeks of activities and amusements. It is estimated that 2 million gallons of beer are consumed during the two-week span.

When Traina joined the Rotary 15 years ago, he got the idea to host an Oktoberfest festival as a fundraising opportunity, motivated by his mother's German heritage and by his love of the German festival. Since then, it has grown into an event that people in the community look forward to each year.

"Oktoberfest in Germany is done at a much larger scale—six million people attend Oktoberfest in Munich from places all over the world. My mother is German and I've been going to Germany since I was a kid. I thought the community would embrace this type of event, and they have. It's gotten bigger and bigger each year," said Traina.

But while the Oktoberfest in Center Moriches will be held again this year, the one in Munich will not. Lord Mayor Dieter Reiter announced earlier in the year that the 187th Munich Oktoberfest would not take place in 2021, saying that the decision to cancel amid a third wave of COVID-19 was one he grappled with.

"It wasn't an easy decision, but I have to make it now and I have done so," said Lord Reiter in a statement on the official website of German Oktoberfest.

Being forced to cancel last year in 2020 was devastating to Rotary members because of the impact it had on fundraising for the year.

"It was very difficult because the funds we raise go to Camp Pa-Qua-Tuck. We normally gross \$60,000 for this event

and then donate the proceeds to the camp, but we couldn't do that. That was the most heartbreaking part of last year for me, personally," said Traina.

Proceeds from Oktoberfest go to support Camp Pa-Qua-Tuck, which has been owned and operated by the Moriches Rotary for 80 years, since opening in 1941 with a mission to help special-needs children on Long Island, according to the camp's website. The camp still focuses on its mission, but has expanded to provide camp services for children and adults with disabilities and now

serves the community on Long Island and beyond, inviting campers for a summer of fun on the 37-acre stretch of land along the shores of Kaler's Pond in Center Moriches.

"Everything from Oktoberfest goes to the day-to-day operations of the camp. The budget is \$1 million a year. We get nothing from the government, it's all run by private donations and fundraising," said Traina.



Always-art-sea

Q&A with artist Danielle Bergh

Danielle Bergh is a science teacher who grew up in Center Moriches and now lives in Manorville. In addition to her teaching, she also owns alwaysartsea, a small business that specializes in sea-glass jewelry. The Tide recently caught up with Bergh to talk about her small business. The interview has been edited slightly for length and clarity.

The Tide: How long have you been unning alwaysartsea?

Bergh: I actually started it in 2019. In 2019, I did my first craft fair at the Center Moriches fair, and then unfortunately, because of the pandemic I wasn't able to do anything last year as far as craft fairs, and then this year I've been doing a few. But last year, actually, during the pandemic, I decided to use that time to actually open a website because I couldn't do craft fairs.

The Tide: Where did you come up with the idea?

Bergh: It kind of all started when I got into finding beach glass, and I got into that hobby actually from seeing a page on Instagram. So, there was this lady that I just kind of stumbled on that lives in Hawaii and collects and finds beach glass, and she would post some of her findings and I just thought that it was the coolest thing. And we're also on

an island and I was like, Why couldn't I look for beach glass around here? So, I started collecting beach glass and then I had a friend's birthday that was coming up and I thought, I think it would be nice if I make a necklace for her. So, the first-ever item that I made was a necklace for my friend. And then I made another necklace for another friend and they came out kind of good, so I thought I could turn this hobby into a little bit of a side business.

The Tide: Did you have any experience making jewelry?

Bergh: I kind of just went for it. I learned along the way. Made mistakes here and there, and learned from it as I went

The Tide: How much beach glass do you have at any one time? I feel like now on Long Island it can be hard to find.

Bergh: It's really hard to find the beach glass. I feel like I'll go and I'll find beach glass and it's not necessarily jewelry quality, so I'm not really able to use them. I do have quite a bit of a collection. When I go and I travel, I'll go and I'll go look for beach glass. I went to Michael's and got myself a stacking set of containers and I have it all separated by color. I would say I have a pretty decent collection.

The Tide: Where was the best place you've traveled to be able to find it?

Bergh: I went to California in the summer of 2018 with my fiancé and we did a road trip from San Francisco

down to San Diego, and I found some really cool and interesting pieces along the way there. But I've heard that other places like Puerto Rico have great beach glass, but I've just never been there myself. I also feel like the best time to look for sea glass is in the winter because there's fewer people looking for it. In the summer, there's a lot of people on the beach, there's a lot of foot traffic, and I'll go to the beach and find nothing because there have been other people looking for it [sea glass] already.

The Tide: How did you come up with the name alwaysartsea?

Bergh: I toyed around with a lot of different ideas, and I actually went back and forth with my best friend on some names, and she actually helped me come up with the name. I thought it was fun and would cover what I was making. The name goes right along with the types of things that I make.

The Tide: How important is it for you to find your sea glass naturally?

Bergh: That's definitely really important. I'm pretty particular about making sure that everything I'm making is with genuine sea glass and it's not something that was purchased at a store. I just feel that it makes it so much more special that it is authentic and that I found it myself. I feel like I have a memory of each piece. I just feel like each piece is special to me and hopefully, the necklaces themselves are special to the people who buy them.

The Tide: How long does it take you to make pieces? What is the entire process like?

Bergh: The longest part would probably be finding them [the sea glass]. I feel like out of 100 pieces of sea glass, there's only a handful that are actually jewelry quality. So, I'll find other pieces that are super, super small, or they have really jagged edges and are not the ideal shape. I drill them myself and that takes a little while, and unfortunately, during the drilling process the pieces will break, and that's heartbreaking for me because they're just so hard to find. So, I drill them and usually I add some sort of bead component, and I'll add a pinch bail, which holds it together, and then I'll put the chain on it.

The thrift shop hop

A guide to thrifting in Center Moriches and Manorville

As the old adage goes, "One man's trash is another man's treasure"—and our local thrift shops truly embody this, selling donated goods at a low price. Whether you thrift to save money, to save the environment or to support your local community, treasures abound. Below are thrift shops located in the Center Moriches and Manorville area. We've let you know where they're located, when they're open and what you may expect shopping there.

*Before reading further, it should be noted that the items found in a thrift shop differ every day and are based on donations—the best way to know what one thrift shop is selling is to go visit.

Center Moriches

Center Moriches United Methodist Church Thrift Store 464 Main Street Center Moriches, NY 11934

Open: Monday, Wednesday, Friday and Saturday from 9 a.m. to 1 p.m.

This thrift shop is located in a white house with a large open-air porch, next to the United Methodist Church in Center Moriches. Each room houses a different category of items like men's clothing, women's clothing, children's clothing and so on. There is also a small section of hard goods in the area in the back of the shop with items like plates, cups, mugs, candle holders, picture frames and so on. On a recent Wednesday, the thrift shop hosted a Christmas in July sale, with Christmas tchotchkes, wrapping paper, crafts, snowman figurines, angel figurines and more.

St. John the Evangelist Thrift Shop 25 Ocean Avenue Center Moriches, NY11934

Open: Wednesdays from 9 a.m. to noon.

This thrift shop is part of St. John the Evangelist Roman Catholic Church; all proceeds go to the church and its various outreach missions. The shop is chockfull of shoes, clothing, jewelry and hard goods - each category has its own highly organized section with some clothing items hanging up and some in labeled

The COVID-19 pandemic greatly impacted the thrift shop's income, and therefore, the missions it supports. Since COVID-19, Sue Diragi, a volunteer in charge of the thrift shop, says fewer people come to shop since they've reopened. As a safety measure, the thrift shop only lets four people in at a time; once that number is exceeded, patrons get a number and are let in to shop once their number is called. Diragi said they give out about 20 numbers now, but in pre-COVID times, double or triple the amount of people would shop.

"We made double the amount before COVID," said Diragi.

On a recent Wednesday, the thrift shop had American-cut glass, a vintage crystal necklace, a trio of Corningware casserole dishes and a bottle of barely used Marc Jacobs perfume for \$5.

The thrift shop sells some items outside, but the nicest stuff is located inside the red, barn-like boutique, according to Diragi. More than three volunteers man the boutique at a time, at least one volunteer per section, including Caroline Mezze, who works at the jewelry counter.

"If it's going to be in here, it has to be in good shape," said Diragi of the boutique.

Manorville

Manorville Historical Society Thrift Shop 50 North Street Manorville, NY 11949

Open: Wednesdays from 10:30 a.m. to 3 p.m.; and on the first Saturday of the month from 10:30 a.m. to 3 p.m.

The thrift shop is run by the Manorville Historical Society and a source of income for them. It is located in the basement of the historical society. The shop is filled to the brim with donated items for sale, including adult and children's clothing, glassware, baskets, kids toys and stuffed animals, appliances, bedding, crafting items, tchotchkes and more.

The shop is located in one large room and organized by category. It can be tough to navigate through because of an overflowing amount of items on each table—but for veteran thrifters, the layout is a positive because hidden gems can be found while digging. On a recent Wednesday, they had Corningware and glass bake casserole dishes, bags full of vintage sewing accessories and barely used spools of holiday ribbon.

On the same recent Wednesday, a steady flow of customers could be seen coming and going, usually leaving with a bag or two in their hands. In other words, the shopping was good.

For customer Jeff Cronin, of Eastport, the decision to go was prompted by an online advertisement and a need for camping equipment for an upcoming trip with his kids.

"I saw an ad for the thrift shop online and I needed camping gear, and the ad said that they had it," said

While he didn't find any camping gear, he did find a microscope, still in the box.

"I was looking on Amazon and these are going for like \$80 there. I figured, even if it is broken or defective, it was only \$5," he said. ■

From pen to paper: a writer's tale


Author MJ Hayes, a former Center Moriches teacher, writes children's books from her Florida home

Former Center Moriches teacher Mary Jane Viaggio Hayes, who goes by the pen name MJ Hayes, is the author of more than nine children's books. Though she finds inspiration in the world around her, it's her own life that reads like a story at times.

The year was 1966, and Hayes was young, fresh out of Adelphi College and working as a third-grade teacher at Center Moriches Elementary School (now known as the Clayton Huey Elementary School), when she was hit by a drunk driver. The accident was horrific, according to Hayes. She was thrown 30 feet into the air and went into a coma vigil, which is an ongoing vegetative state. According to mayoclinic.org, coma vigil is rare and happens to only about 20,000 people per year; a person can come out of it or may remain in a vegetative state forever.

Hayes said her mother was instrumental in her recovery, working tirelessly to "revitalize" her brain by reading stories and reciting math problems and other facts. After 11 months, Hayes miraculously recovered and went back into the field she loved so much, teaching—but no longer in Center Moriches.

However, the accident would stick with her for the rest of her life, long-forgotten bits of her memory reemerging like letters in a cloudy bowl of alphabet soup.

One such memory reappeared years later, while reading through the chapters of her own book, "Dakota, Help Me See the Light," about a blind child named Gavin. Hayes realized that she had gone blind for a period of time after her accident. Her father had come to visit her in the hospital and she remembered hearing him and wanting to see him but only seeing blackness, which is what Gavin sees in the book.

"My dad came in and he made it known that he was there with me. I heard his voice and I can remember saying to him, 'Daddy, I wish I could see what I hear,' but I couldn't see. My dad was there, but I couldn't see him," she said.

Even before the accident that changed her life, Hayes enjoyed writing. It wasn't until she became a teacher that she decided to start writing books; at first, they were class projects.

"I've always loved writing. As a kid, I would write stories and then draw the pictures, too. Always writing and drawing. Then, once I got into teaching, I started writing as like a class project. 'Ollie the Octopus' was a class project. It wasn't published, but everyone loved it," she said.

When Hayes moved to Florida after a divorce in 2007, she decided to double down on writing.

"I'm not going to go to the bars and drink. I stayed home and worked and wrote and researched. I worked a lot, as in like 24/7. And I spent a lot of time in writing classes learning how to become a better writer. I was always working on proposals, typing away—always typing," she said.

Hayes attended conference after conference and writing class after writing class, always working to become a better writer, developing her voice and style. Then, she attended a Highlights conference and met Patricia Gauch. Gauch is well known in the world of children's writing as an author and the former editorial director of Philomel Books.

At a breakfast breakout session, Hayes told Gauch about her latest idea, a children's book about a deaf girl named Emma who puts on a silent concert, picking up instruments and playing them but without any sound coming out, and at the same time teaching a bully the true meaning of silence. Gauch thought the idea was unique and interesting, Hayes said.

"She told me, 'When you're finished writing, I want you to contact me,' "

said Hayes.

When Hayes finished writing "Emma's House of Sound," she sent the manuscript to Gauch and Gauch sent back two pages full of edits and constructive criticism, which Hayes said she was incredibly grateful for. Hayes kept on writing and editing, but now had something new to research: how to get published.

According to Hayes, there are three different ways to get published: by finding a traditional publisher; hiring a company to help you publish; or self-publishing.

Hayes decided that she wanted to do it all herself.

"I hire my illustrator, my editor. I'd still be waiting to be published if I hadn't done it myself," she said.

Hayes said doing it all herself has given her greater creative control so she can delve into subjects she enjoys. Doing it herself also means she has had to do her own publicity.

Hayes promotes herself with a website

and on social media. She also stays active doing school events and appearances, and has won writing awards on Long Island and in St. Augustine, Fla. Though, her goal is always to bring awareness to the type of children she writes about.

"I never thought I would be where I am now. I always wanted to write and become famous. But I didn't want to get awards just because I want to put them on my wall. I want to get awards to bring substantive help to a child. That's what makes me write," said Hayes.

As for what is next for Hayes, she says she's always coming up with new book ideas.

"There's a lot of spontaneity. I saw a squirrel eating a nut and got an idea for a book. I lost a shoe and got an idea for a book. My books are cute and they always have an educational and philosophical slant," she said.



Thomas Valva case documentation decision

On Jan. 17, 2020 Thomas Valva died after authorities said his father, Michael Valva, and his fiancée, Angela Pollina, forced him and his brother to sleep in an unheated garage overnight as the outside temperature fell to 19 degrees.

The Suffolk County Legislature responded and convened the Special Legislative Committee to Investigate the Untimely Death of Thomas Valva to analyze the circumstances that led to his tragic death.

On Feb. 4, 2020, the special committee approved the issuance of a subpoena for all pertinent case records from the Suffolk County Department of Social Services. The department refused to comply, citing NYS Social Service law, resulting in the special committee commencing litigation to compel production of the documents. The motion was filed on April 2, 2020, as an Article 78 proceeding.

Child Protective Service files remain confidential in most cases. However, these materials can be released if a child dies and if their release would not endanger any surviving children. On Monday, NYS Supreme Court Justice Joseph Santorelli issued a non-final decision authorizing an in-camera review of these documents by the court. After the in-camera review, Santorelli will render a final determination regarding whether or which documents shall be released to the special committee.

"The legislature is a co-equal branch of government and has a right to understand what led to this unimaginable tragedy. We need to address any shortcomings in our county departments to

ensure something like this does not happen again," said Suffolk County Legislature presiding officer Rob Calarco. "These documents are essential to this process and I am pleased that the court is reviewing them for potential release to our special committee for analysis. Nothing can bring Thomas back. But by diligently examining all facets of this case, we can honor his memory and find solutions that will better protect our most vulnerable population."

Calarco, deputy presiding officer Kara Hahn and Legis. Tom Cilmi are the three members of the Special Legislative Committee and will continue to seek answers as it relates to this case. ■
