Silly Lily receives marine commercial code change

Public hearing held in May

After a public hearing was held during the May 26 Town of Brookhaven Town Board meeting, Silly Lily, located at the end of Adelaide Avenue in East Moriches, was approved for a change of zone from A1 residential to marine commercial. The code change will allow the site to legalize what was there and to normalize the parking of vehicles, boats, and add a small, vegetated buffer to the north.

Joe Sanzano, member of the town Planning Department, described the property as being located just south of Montauk Highway with about 1.4 acres. The property was used for boat storage and parking since 1967, and went before the zoning board of appeals in 1981 for a fishing station certificate, and then authorized a letter of correction in 1984.

The purpose of the most recent code change is to conform with town code for its current use as a marina with boat slips, water rentals, a building for repairs and a building for retail. The owners also proposed proper parking changes, as well as an added buffer to the north with landscaping.

However, the representatives and owners of the property vowed not to allow the site to become a private club or a party location. Additionally, photos were put on the record showing the various upgrades made by the owners, Jay Scott and Steve Chiros, since taking ownership six years ago.

Scott read two articles from the '30s and '40s highlighting the importance of the community staple. He said he hopes to continue to serve the people of East Moriches, but also stressed the need for some change.

"I promised to always keep it a fishing station," he said. "This rezone is to have it continue for another 100 years."

The public was then heard, with over a dozen speakers. The majority spoke in support of the marina, though a handful discussed their concerns as neighboring residential properties.


Resident to the north, Patricia Melia, who has lived there for over 40 years, claimed the new owner has changed the property tremendously without proper approvals or a public hearing.

"As an abutting property owner, I am uniquely affected by the zoning violations," she said, frustrated, and noting that a 10-foot buffer is not enough to ensure the privacy of her home.

She also said there are two food trucks, which are not permitted, utilizing the land both for service and overnight parking.

Others residents like Adam Lowenbein described the marina as a gathering place and a family gem in the community

LI Honor Flight takes off

First group of Vietnam veterans sent to nation's capital

Alongside family and friends, Christine Mundy-Ortutay stood in MacArthur Airport, the air saturated with excitement, a handmade sign at her side.

The poster board displayed a photo of a voung man in his green helmet and fatigues. Blue confetti circles spelled the words, "Welcome Home Dad."

Mundy-Ortutay floated in a sea of hundreds waiting to greet the passengers of a LI Honor Flight that sent veterans to Washington, D.C., for free on June 4, after a two-year hiatus due to the COVID-19 pandemic. For the first time in the Long Island chapter's history, the nonprofit flew veterans of the Vietnam War to the nation's capital, where they could take in the Vietnam Memorial wall in person.

Five decades ago, a nation divided on the Vietnam War showed sparse support for those who fought it. When those who served in Vietnam returned home, they were not given nearly as warm a welcome as the one that awaited them that Saturday evening.

that everybody supported him then and he has support now," Mundy-Ortutay said, waiting to greet her father, Paul Mundy. "I think he's just honored to see everybody with the support. He's my hero, I love him. He was 18 when he went to Vietnam; he's 75 now, and I think this is amazing and he'll love it." Family and close friends of the 37

"I'm really hoping that it just shows

Vietnam veterans and sole World War II veteran on the Honor Flight comprised a small portion of the crowd at MacArthur. Girl Scouts and Boy Scouts stood at the ready with boxes of cookies and flags, and groups of families and friends arrived with signs to offer thanks to the veterans they had never met.

"We're always here to welcome them, appreciate their service," Peter Hanson said, his wife Sherri Hanson at his side, a "Combat Veteran Vietnam" cap atop his head. "I know what it was like having been over there.'

"It's great to see the children and the young adults here," he added. "These guys and gals are going to feel so great coming through here seeing all these people.

The 38 veterans aboard the Honor Flight headed for Baltimore/Washington International Thurgood Marshall Airport from MacArthur at 6:15 a.m. After a ride to the nation's capital, the veterans visited the World War II Memorial, the Vietnam Veterans Memorial and Arlington National Cemetery.

To date, Honor Flight has sent over 250,000 veterans to Washington, and the Long Island chapter has flown over 1,800. Even after so many trips, Honor Flight board member and fellow veteran William Donahue said the emotional weight remains heavy.

"You're just not ready for it," he said. "You think, Well you've seen it, you've watched them experience the appreciation that they get when they arrive at Baltimore or at the memorials, but it just impacts you in a way all over again that makes you feel proud to be a part of this organization.'

On the flight home, Honor Flight surprised the veterans with a mail call, a lifeline which supported them through their service and kept them connected with civilian life. Some letters were simply addressed "Dear Veteran," from school children or other groups, while others came from family and friends.

"These are letters that, for the most part, no family member would probably write, ever, to their veteran, but this gives them the opportunity to do that," Donahue said. "The veteran is just overwhelmed to read the appreciation and gratitude that they have. It opens up a whole new world between the veteran

and that family member, so it's mighty cool."

When they landed in MacArthur Airport at 8:45 p.m. that Saturday evening, the veterans received their Girl Scout cookies, shook hands, saluted, and soaked in the thunderous cheers and applause that rivaled the volume of the Eastern Long Island Police Pipes and Drums Band.

The procession of servicemembers, surprised by the fleet of support, displayed a breadth of emotion. Smiles were plentiful and the tears were genuine when family members embraced.

Such was the case when Paul Mundy waded through the crowd to his family and friends awaiting him.

'It started as soon as we got here this morning to leave," Mundy said. "They were clapping, they were clapping everywhere I went—the Tomb of the Unknown Soldier, going for dinner, every place. Then I get off, and this! My best friend for 70 years, cousins, my wife, my daughters, everything.'

"It's amazing," he continued, himself tearing up as his children wept and grandchildren hugged his leg. "It's amazing. It really is touching; we really appreciate it. I guess I never thought of the appreciation maybe we should have

Memorial Day parade honors fallen veterans

As the sun shone high above Center Moriches on May 30, families lined up along Main Street for the annual Memorial Day parade.

The procession kicked off promptly at 9 a.m. from Lake Avenue and headed east towards Mt. Pleasant Cemetery. Families sat in lawn chairs along the sidewalk or tailgated in truck beds as marching bands, firefighters, Paquatuck Squaws, Little League teams, and other local groups and businesses marched and drove down the pavement.

The VFW Post 414 had been planning the parade since the beginning of the year, according to post commander Bobby Galbraith, to secure performers and organize floats. Perhaps more important was the planning for the ceremony after the parade at Mt. Pleasant Cemetery.

"To me, the most important part isn't even the parade, it's the ceremony," Galbraith said. "The big part at the ceremony are the eulogies, the remembrance of all that served and had passed, the laying of the wreaths, the laying of the flowers. Everything has a meaning: the 21-gun salute, the taps, singing 'God Bless America.'

'It's all about the remembrance of all the veterans that have served and have passed," he continued. "Not necessarily that died in war, but all the men and women that served that are now gone. It's a day for us to remember them and honor them. That's the important part."

While a few hundred people flocked to Main Street for the parade, Galbraith

said he hopes for a larger crowd at both the parade and the cemetery service next year.

At this year's cemetery ceremony, the commander delivered the eulogy, senior VFW officers laid flowers, and a clergyperson from St. John's led those in attendance through a prayer.

"It's a nice day, it's an emotional day, and it's an important day," Galbraith said of the celebrations. "Veterans Dav is for all the living. Memorial Day is for all the guys that have passed.'

Silly Lily by opening it to the public, [and it] has become a town square," he said. "They've created a place where everyone goes to hangout.'

Others described it as a magic place, bringing back their childhood.

After the public was heard, councilman Dan Panico proceeded to question the applicant, ensuring certain promises were made on the record in an effort to protect the community.

We sit here tonight to help keep Silly Lily going into the future, but also affording the property owners to keep it from becoming something it was never intended," Panico said.

He first asked about the hours of operation, to which the owners promised to close by 8 p.m., though they had no intentions to chain off the property at night. Panico also requested the food truck leave at the end of the day by 9 p.m. without parking on site overnight.

"It has to come and go," he said, explaining the code.

Then, he questioned the property owners' intentions of alcohol sales. The owners said they are waiting on permission to serve beer and wine from the State Liquor Authority, thought they noted, again, the business will be closed by 8 p.m. every night and will only be seasonal from Memorial Day through October

Directly following the public hearing, after much discussion, the board unanimously passed the resolution for the code change.

"Silly Lily lives on, and a piece of Long Island's maritime history will be

able to continue. As one of the last fishing stations in Brookhaven, we worked to craft zoning approvals that enable the tradition to continue into the future, but also safeguard the residential community in the area," said Panico of the passage. "I believe we struck the right balance."



As the race began, runners jolted out to the front of the pack, while others jogged or walked, many of them pushing strollers or holding leashes. The event has many regular participants, including Gabrielle Comanda, who was joined by her mother, Lisa Comanda, and dogs, Portia and Oats.

"My brother actually knew Anthony Parlato; he was his basketball coach,' Gabrielle Comanda said. "So we always want to come out and support. Typically, the weather is nice and it's a great

A conversation with ex-Met Bill Pulsipher

Former pitcher played 19 seasons of professional baseball

Bill Pulsipher pitched 19 seasons of professional baseball, spent six seasons in Major League Baseball with the New York Mets, Milwaukee Brewers, Boston Red Sox, Chicago White Sox, and St. Louis Cardinals. as well as four seasons with the Long Island Ducks from 2004-2007. Pulsipher is the father of Leyton Pulsipher, member of Center Moriches varsity baseball 2022 Long Island Champions, who is committed to Central Connecticut State this fall. Pulsipher currently is a pitching instructor at 365 Athletics in Bellport.

TIDE: In June 1991, you were 17 years old and just graduated Fairfax High School in Virginia, then were drafted in the second round 66th overall by the New York Mets. What were your initial emotions on being

Pulsipher: Well, I was ecstatic, obviously, to be drafted by the Mets the team I had grown up watching play. Even though I wasn't from New York, I was a Mets fan because obviously the Mets were very good during the mid-'80s when I was growing up, so I was ecstatic to be drafted by the team that I had followed growing up. I actually wore a Mets hat throughout high school, so it was a dream come true. My favorite team of all time.

Tide: Your third season of professional baseball was quite a summer! As a starting pitcher on the Binghamton Mets, the New York Mets Double A affiliate, you, Edgardo Alfonzo, and Jason Isringhausen were the superstars of the team, leading your

club to the Eastern League Championship. You threw a no-hitter in Game 2 of the championship series and that season logged 201 innings, striking out 171 batters. Talk about the thrill of that season and about playing ball with Alfonzo, Isringhausen, and other teammates in which you reunited a few years later in Queens.

Pulsipher: That was a special team. The majority of that group we lost in the finals the previous year in the Florida State League, and we kind of felt like we had some unfinished business, and obviously moving up to Double A, that's kind of the most competitive league that's full of prospects, so we kind of felt like we had to go take of our business, and that was a heck of a season and great group of guys there. Rey Ordonez ended up coming and being on that team during the season as well. He came up. Alberto Castillo played in the Major Leagues with the Mets as well, and that group of guys kind of came up together, so to speak, and it was a special, special summer. One of the best summers of my life and a lot of fun.

Tide: In June 1995, you were 21 and took the mound at Shea vs. the Houston Astros making your Major League debut. I know it didn't go the way you would have liked, but can you describe your emotions when you iirst ran out oi the augout and took your warmups about to toe the rubber in Flushing?

Pulsipher: Well, I would say that the first inning didn't go how I would like. I always felt like I gave up five runs in the first inning; those were a couple of balls hit into the gaps. I ended up going seven innings that day and did get the loss and only gave up two more runs in the final six innings that I threw, and even though I lost I kind of felt like I came out with the win, because to be able to go from giving up five runs in the first inning to be able to go through and walk off the mound after getting that final out as opposed to the manager come out and take the ball from you. But that's another thing I tell people. That's the second thing I did that will never happen again, is I threw 131 pitches my first start in the Major Leagues and that will never happen again. I was very nervous in the first inning, being a Mets fan growing up and now living the dream, you're standing there on Shea Stadium field, the same field that Dwight Gooden, my hero growing up, and Tom Seaver and all the great names of the past, and it was a great moment and it didn't go exactly how I wanted, but like I said, to be able to walk off the mound after getting 21 outs as opposed to having to walk out of there after the first inning giving up five runs. But it was a dream come true.

Tide: What brought you to Long Island?

Pulsipher: Obviously, playing for the Mets originally. And my wife, who I met in Florida, her family is originally from Lindenhurst, West Babylon area, and when I got done playing I was coaching for a while and coaching wasn't making enough money and [I] had young kids at the time, so my brother-in-law was in the construction business and I had got offered a chance to go work there with him and got into the road construction and my wife wanted to go back up to Long Island, and that was where my opportunity to work was, so we ended up back out here.

Tide: You were a starting pitcher on the 2004 Long Island Ducks championship team. Talk about how exciting that must have been bringing the first championship to Long Island.

Pulsipher: It was a lot of fun. We had a really good group of guys—veteran guys, a lot of guys that had been playing a long time, and guys that had big league service time, and guys that were hungry

to still get back, and I did end up signing with Seattle during that year and went out and played Triple A and finished the season there. I was actually well, but my back went out on me and I had back surgery and I missed the last couple weeks of the season and the opportunity to get called up in Seattle, but I was healthy enough to come back for the playoffs with the Ducks and there were a few guys that signed elsewhere during the year. We all came back towards playoff time and finished the goal there. I always tell people, it doesn't matter where you're at to be able to win a championship, especially those athletes that go their whole lives, whether it be Little League or high school or all the way up to pro ball and the Major Leagues, that never get a chance to play in the championship, let alone win a championship.


